

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PRESENT SIMPLE





Can you give me some examples?


Yes! Of course, we use the present simple to talk about things which are repeated every day, every week, every year, etc.

I *get up* at 7 o'clock.

I **have** swimming practice every week.

We always **go** on holiday in the summer.

We use adverbs of frequency sometimes, often, usually and other time expressions like on Mondays, twice a week or in the summer.



I like him a lot.

Sophie works as a teacher.

They *live* in Argentina.

We also use the present simple for general <u>facts</u>.

Punta Arenas is really cold in Winter.



So what do I need to know about forming the present simple?



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The main thing is that the third person singular forms end in **–s** or **–es**. That's for **he**, **she**, or **it**.

He watches black and White films at his cinema club on Wednesday.

He *cooks* beans every Monday.





What about questions and negatives?

For most verbs we use the present simple of the verb do/does + subject +
infinitive verb to form questions.

Do you see him on Wednesdays?

Does Jack like sports?

• For negatives we use the *subject + do/does + infinitive verb*

Daisy and Jack don't go out together much at the weekend

I don't think Coldplay, are boring.

Verbs ending in:
-o, -x, -sh, -ch

You need to add -es

Verbs ending in:

-y preceded by a vowel

You need to add -s

Verbs ending in: -y preceded by a consonant

You need to <u>change</u> the **-y** into an **-i** and add **-es**
