

COMPARATIVES AND SUPERLATVES

When we want to compare two or more things, we can change the form
of adjectives by adding -er or -est. We can also use extra words like more or most and expression like not as ... as.



I think he **is** tall**er than** me.








With most one-syllable adjectives, we add *-er* or *est*, and with most adjectives with two syllables or more, we add *more* or (the) *most*. In comparatives, we also use *than* before the second thing which is

compared if ir is mentioned.

With one-syllable adjectives ending in vowel + consonant, remember to **double** the final consonant before **-er/-est**.






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What about the adjectives ending in –y like crazy?





WHAT OTHER WAYS OF COMPARING THINGS ARE THERE?

Yes!, less and least are also ways of comparing things. They are used more in writing Ex.:

It is less cold in the North of the country than in the South (the North is warmer, but both North and South are cold)
